Despite her long bouts of illness and the struggles she faced while commuting, she never lost interest in teaching. She loved life and loved all who were in her life. She was keen on providing help to all of her students and colleagues and always gave voice to the discriminated. She will be fondly remembered not only as a teacher, but as a warm and kind human being. Generations of students would remember her teaching of fiction. They would remember her lectures on American literature, especially American Drama, along with those on Slyvia Plath, Ben Jonson's satiric drama, Charles Dickens and the Great Paintings of Tagore.

Among her colleagues, she was known as a gentle and generous person who would accept everyone as family. Her disability never stopped her from performing her duties and she was a beacon for many as she never once complained about the hardships that must have been her constant companion. With time her disability became more and more pronounced, but she never allowed anyone to feel her pain. She believed in fighting her own demons, sharing her agony only with a handful of very close people. Her spirit was one that inspired many and will keep doing so for ages to come. Always conscientious, she would always be anxious as her ability to serve the students was hampered by repeated bouts of illness. Even till the end she was more concerned about her duties than her own well-being.
